Countable

Countable and uncontable nouns

The nouns can be: countable or uncountable.

The countable nouns are those that can be counted using only numbers and that do not need an additional unit of measurement, for example:

- A table
- Two chairs
- A policeman
- A child
- Ten children

Another feature is that they can be singular or plural, for example:

- A friend, two friends
- One chair, three chairs

When the number is not exactly known, the word "many" is attached, for example: many students, many chairs

In the interrogative form it is used:

How many books are there? and the answer is usually a number or an expression, for example:

- There are ten books.
- There are a lot of books.

Uncountable nouns are those that, to be counted, need a unit of measure, for example:

- Milk
- Coffee
- Money
- Meat
- Juice

For liquids you need to specify if it is a liter, a cup, a glass, for other nouns you need to specify if it is a piece, a pound, a kilo.

In relation to the word money, we can not say I have 10 money, we also need a unit of measure, like quetzales or dollars.

These nouns are only used as singular. To make references to these nouns, a unit of measure should be used, for example:

- She drinks a liter of milk.
- I have 100 quetzales.

When the exact amount is not known, it is said:

- I have a lot of money.
- She drinks a lot of milk.
